# Annual Governance and Accountability Return 2018/19 Part 3

# Guidance notes on completing Part 3 of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return 2018/19

- 1. Every smaller authority in England that either received gross income or incurred gross expenditure exceeding £25,000 must complete Part 3 of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return at the end of each financial year in accordance with Proper Practices.
- 2. The Annual Governance and Accountability Return is made up of three parts, pages 3 to 6:
  - The annual internal audit report is completed by the authority's internal auditor.
  - Sections 1 and 2 are to be completed and approved by the authority.
  - Section 3 is completed by the external auditor and will be returned to the authority.
- 3. The authority **must** approve Section 1, Annual Governance Statement, before approving Section 2, Accounting Statements, and both **must** be approved and published **before 1 July 2019.**
- 4. An authority with either gross income or gross expenditure exceeding £25,000 or an authority with neither income nor expenditure exceeding £25,000, but which is unable to certify itself as exempt, or is requesting a limited assurance review, **must** return to the external auditor by email or post (not both):
  - the Annual Governance and Accountability Return Sections 1 and 2, together with
  - · a bank reconciliation as at 31 March 2019
  - · an explanation of any significant year on year variances in the accounting statements
  - · notification of the commencement date of the period for the exercise of public rights
  - Annual Internal Audit Report 2018/19

Unless requested, do not send any additional documents to your external auditor. Your external auditor will ask for any additional documents needed.

Once the external auditor has completed the review and is able to give an opinion on the limited assurance review, the Annual Governance and Accountability Section1, Section 2 and Section 3 – External Auditor Report and Certificate will be returned to the authority by email or post.

# **Publication Requirements**

Under the Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015, authorities must publish the following information on a publicly accessible website:

Before 1 July 2019 authorities must publish:

- Notice of the period for the exercise of public rights and a declaration that the accounting statements are as yet unaudited;
- · Section 1 Annual Governance Statement 2018/19, approved and signed, page 4
- Section 2 Accounting Statements 2018/19, approved and signed, page 5

Not later than 30 September 2019 authorities must publish:

- Notice of conclusion of audit
- Section 3 External Auditor Report and Certificate
- Sections 1 & 2 of AGAR including any amendments as a result of the limited assurance review.

It is recommended as best practice, to avoid any potential confusion by local electors and interested parties, that you also publish the Annual Internal Audit Report, page 3.

The Annual Governance and Accountability Return constitutes the annual return referred to in the Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015. Throughout, the words 'external auditor' have the same meaning as the words 'local auditor' in the Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015.

\*for a complete list of bodies that may be smaller authorities refer to schedule 2 to the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014.

# Guidance notes on completing Part 3 of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return 2018/19

- The authority must comply with Proper Practices in completing Sections 1 and 2 of this Annual Governance and Accountability Return. Proper Practices are found in the Practitioners' Guide\* which is updated from time to time and contains everything needed to prepare successfully for the financial year-end and the subsequent work by the external auditor.
- Make sure that the Annual Governance and Accountability Return is complete (i.e. no empty highlighted boxes),
  and is properly signed and dated. Where amendments are made by the authority to the AGAR after it has
  been approved by the authority and before it has been reviewed by the external auditor, the Chairman and
  RFO should initial the amendments and if necessary republish the amended AGAR and recommence the
  period for the exercise of public rights. If the Annual Governance and Accountability Return contains unapproved
  or unexplained amendments, it may be returned and additional costs will be incurred.
- The authority should receive and note the annual internal audit report if possible prior to approving the annual
  governance statement and before approving the accounts.
- Use the checklist provided below to review the Annual Governance and Accountability Return for completeness before returning it to the external auditor by email or post (not both).
- Do not send the external auditor any information not specifically requested. However, you must inform your
  external auditor about any change of Clerk, Responsible Financial Officer or Chairman, and provide
  relevant email addresses and telephone numbers.
- Make sure that the copy of the bank reconciliation to be sent to your external auditor with the Annual Governance
  and Accountability Return covers all the bank accounts. If the authority holds any short-term investments, note their
  value on the bank reconciliation. The external auditor must be able to agree the bank reconciliation to Box 8 on the
  accounting statements (Section 2, page 5). An explanation must be provided of any difference between Box 7 and
  Box 8. More help on bank reconciliation is available in the Practitioners' Guide\*.
- Explain fully significant variances in the accounting statements on page 5. Do not just send a copy of the detailed
  accounting records instead of this explanation. The external auditor wants to know that you understand the reasons
  for all variances. Include complete numerical and narrative analysis to support the full variance.
- If the external auditor has to review unsolicited information, or receives an incomplete bank reconciliation, or variances are not fully explained, additional costs may be incurred.
- Make sure that the accounting statements add up and that the balance carried forward from the previous year (Box 7 of 2018) equals the balance brought forward in the current year (Box 1 of 2019).
- The Responsible Financial Officer (RFO), on behalf of the authority, must set the period for the exercise of public rights. From the commencement date for a single period of 30 consecutive working days, the approved accounts and accounting records can be inspected. Whatever period the RFO sets it must include a common inspection period during which the accounts and accounting records of all smaller authorities must be available for public inspection of the first ten working days of July.
- The authority must publish the information required by Regulation 15 (2), Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015, including the period for the exercise of public rights and the name and address of the external auditor before 1 July 2019.



# 1 Introduction

## This page is part of Section 3 – External auditor report 2018/19

The following matters have been raised to draw items to the attention of Chilton Town Council. These matters came to the attention of Mazars LLP during the review of the Annual Governance and Accountability Report (AGAR) for the year ended 31 March 2019. This report must be presented alongside the AGAR to a full meeting of the smaller authority for review.

The review of the annual return may not disclose all shortcomings of the systems as some matters may not have come to the attention of the auditor. For this reason, the matters raised may not be the only ones that exist.

Except for the matters reported below on the basis of our review of the annual return, in our opinion the information in the annual return is in accordance with proper practices and no other matters have come to our attention giving cause for concern that relevant legislative and regulatory requirements have not been met.

The Council has included the Miners Welfare Charity Trust Fund within their figures at Section 2 of the AGAR as the Charity's accounts were not fully separated until 1 April 2019. However, the Council asserted in its Annual Governance Statement that it put in place effective arrangements for financial management during the year and for the preparation of the accounting statements. In future, the Council should ensure that all transactions in respect of the trust fund are managed through the separate bank account and the new ledger account set up on 1 April 2019.

The Council asserted in its Annual Governance Statement that during 2018/19 it provided proper opportunity for the exercise of public rights but it did not publish the audited accounts and completion notice at the conclusion of the 2017/18 audit on a free to access website in accordance with the Accounts and Audit Regulations (2015) until August 2019. Moreover, these regulations require that the period of public rights covers 30 working days including the first 10 working days of July. In 2018 this requirement was not met as the period was started late and only covered 24 working days. In 2019 the public rights period was correct but there was no statement on the website explaining that the accounts were unaudited. In 2019/20 the Council needs to put in place arrangements to ensure that it fully complies with the Accounts and Audit Regulations and as this report is dated after 30 September it should answer no to assertion 4 on the 2019/20 Annual Governance Statement.

The Council had not fully implemented recommendations made in 2017/18 internal and external audit reports at 31 March 2019 because of the delay in separating trust fund accounts. The Council answered yes to assertion 7 in the 2018/19 Annual Governance Statement, claiming it has taken appropriate action in respect of audit reports. In future, the Council should ensure that appropriate action in response to audit recommendations is taken within a reasonable time.

## Other matters not affecting our opinion which we draw to the attention of the smaller authority:

The 2018/19 internal audit report identified significant weaknesses in internal control and governance. The Council failed to submit the annual return to the Charities Commission within 10 months of financial year-end, did not update its asset register until after year-end and did not fully comply with its financial regulations. The Council has correctly answered no to assertions 2 and 9 in its annual governance statement. The Council should ensure that it implements internal audit recommendations promptly and complies with the reporting requirements of the Charities Commission in future.

The Council did not include a complete bank reconciliation in the Annual Governance and Accountability Return submission for audit review as it only provided a reconciliation for one of the 3 accounts. The bank reconciliation is a key management control and in future the Council should ensure that it is prepared as part of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return submission). In future the Council should use the standard proforma provided in our guidance or in the Practitioner's Guide when preparing the bank reconciliation.

No other matters came to our attention.
